
TYPICAL PROPERTIES

Wingate

Station Town is a village in County Durham. It is situated to the south of Wingate, west of Hartlepool and is easily accessible by road via the A19 and B1280.

Station Town is within the Blackhall ward/electoral division in the constituency of Sedgefield.

Sedgefield's is known for the fact that Tony Blair was its MP for a considerable time, during which time George W Bush visited Sedgefield with Tony Blair.

The beautiful St Edmunds Church is noted for for its ornate 17th-century Cosin woodwork.

There a good selection of shops in the area including food shops and chemists.

Shildon

Shildon is a town near Bishop Auckland in County Durham.

It is home to the National Railway Musuem and holds an annual Shildon Steam Gala.

A bustling small town with a town centre. Scott Street is near to the town centre in a quiet residential area.

Shildon is a town in County Durham, in England. The population taken at the 2011 Census was 9,976.[1] It is situated 2 miles (3.2 km) south east of Bishop Auckland, 11 miles (18 km) north of Darlington, 13 miles (21 km) from Durham, 23 miles (37 km) from Sunderland and 30 miles (48 km) from Newcastle upon Tyne.

At the dawn of the 19th century Shildon was a few houses on a cross road. The Industrial Revolution and the coming of the railways saw the town grow.[3] In 1801 the population was recorded at being 100 people. Their occupations were noted as being in agriculture, coal mining and the growing textiles industry[4].

Shildon is the home a large Railway Museum which is a popular attraction. It is a commuter town to Bishop Auckland

Blackhall Colliery



Blackhall Colliery is a village on the North Sea Coast of County Durham it is situation on the A1086 between Howden and Hartlepool. Built around the once extensive mining industry Blackhall's colliery closed in 1981.

There is now an industrial estate built over part of the old colliery buildings. After the mines closed down the once busy village became economically challenged. As time has passed other industries have begun to emerge to once again create employment in the area.



Seaham is a lively harbour town on Durham's Heritage Coast. Dramatic cliff top views, home to one of England's oldest churches, beautiful beaches to relax on. There is a wide choice of bars, cafes and restaurants along the busy seafront.



Dalton Park, the region's biggest outlet shopping centre is close by.

Seaham has one of the finest hotels and spas in the North at Seaham Hall. There are three local golf clubs, Seaham Harbour Golf Club,



Seaham Golf Club and Sharpley Golf Club.

Ferryhill

Ferryhill is a town in south-central County Durham, England with a population of 11,651 people. The town grew rapidly in 1900s around the coal mining indus-

try. The last mine closed in 1968.





Ferryhill lies on the medieval Great North Road which used to be the A1, now the A167 which leads to Durham City and Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the north and Darlington to the South.

Ferryhill Carrs is a designated local nature Reserve at the eastern edge of the town.

Bishop Auckland

Bishop Auckland is a market town in County Durham. It is located about 12 miles northwest of Darlington and 12 miles southwest of Durham.

Bishop Auckland has a population of 24,392. Much of Bishops Auckland's early history surrounds the bishops of Durham and the establishment of a hunting lodge which later became the main residence of the Bishops of Durham.

During the Industrial Revolution the town grew rapidly as coal mining took hold as an important industry. The subsequent decline of the coal mining industry in the late twentieth century has been

Blamed for a fall in the town's fortunes in other sectors. Today the largest sector of employment in the town in manufacturing.

The property is near to West Auckland which is to the west of Bishop Auckland on the A688 road.

West Auckland Town FC is famously the "The Home of the First World Cup" as its football team were the winners of the Sir Thomas Lipton Trophy, one of the first international footballing competitions.

West Auckland has a new shopping centre with Tesco's and various other superstores which is a great attraction to the area.
